3. N. Chance Cunningham: Remnants of the Tribe of Asher in Lowland Scotland

Yair,

Good day to you! I wanted to reach out to express my continual gratitude for your works. As the title of this email suggests, I have found some interesting information regarding the Tribe of Asher... in Scotland. Let's put the Scottish Lowlands under the scope and divide this a bit to better understand.

I recently came into possession of a book called: "Studies in Lowlands Scots", written by James Colville and printed in Edinburgh, Scotland, 1909. This book primarily teaches the reader and student about the language of the Lowlands, i.e. "Scots". What I found the most interesting was an aleph-bet chart which had, what James calls, "Phoenician" influence.

Though the Scots language was widely known by the Lowland Clans of Scotland, this language was primarily spoken by the Eastern nations (Clans) found within the Lowlands. When we take into account the Tribe of Asher and their Tribal Lands of Inheritance; we can make an interesting connection, all in the same light, when we take a look at the lands of Ayrshire, Scotland or County Ayr.

Anciently speaking, the Ayrshire area was home to a number of Clans, but was ruled by only a handful of Marquis, Earls, Viscounts, and Barony. These prominent leaders were, as William Robertson wrote in his book called, "Ayrshire: Its History and Historic Families, 1908: the Kennedys, the Montgomeries, the Boyles, the Dukes of Portland, the Marquisate of Bute, the Earldom of Loudoun, the Stairs, the Cunningham Earls of Glencairn, the Boyds, the Cochranes, the Hamiltons, and the Fergussons.
